#### **Books:**

- Architecture: A Very Short Introduction by Andrew Ballantyne Explore the
  fascinating history of different styles and movements, from Gothic to Modernism, and
  discover the power and influence of architecture in society. With vivid illustrations
  and engaging examples, this book is a must-read for anyone interested in the built
  environment.
- Phantom Architecture by Philip Wilkinson This book takes you on a journey through history, exploring magnificent buildings and structures that never made it past the blueprint stage. Discover towering castles, glittering palaces and futuristic skyscrapers that were never built, and learn about the fascinating stories and characters behind these phantom structures. A captivating read for anyone interested in architecture, design or history.
- Form, Space, and Order by Francis D.K. Ching This book is a must-read for anyone interested in the basics of architectural design. With clear explanations and illustrations, you'll learn how architects use form, space and order to create functional and aesthetically pleasing buildings.

• IKEA's Democratic Design Philosophy – The concept of "democratic design" was introduced by French designer and visionary Phillipe Stark as "design that provides quality pieces at accessible prices". Ikea adopted and expanded this idea around five key principles: form, function, sustainability, quality and low price. Ikea is spreading the gospel of "democratic design" across the globe through its 300-plus stores in 25 countries and its rapidly growing internet presence as the world's largest furniture retailer since 2008.

• How the world's tallest skyscraper was built by Ted-Ed - In 2004, construction began on a new building in Dubai, promising a revolutionary design that would dwarf the rest of the world's skyscrapers.
