

## **Politics & Debate Reading List**

If you'd like to start exploring the subject ahead of the start of your course, here's a list of resources that will help you engage with some of the ideas you'll be exploring in more depth across the one or two weeks. These are by no means in order of importance and you don't have to look at all of them – let your instinct choose what sounds more interesting to you.

# Whether you're doing the one or two week course, the reading list below is applicable!

Politics underpins just about everything in every country around the world. What you learn in school, the price of products in the supermarket and how easy it is for you to access healthcare are all very everyday things that are linked inextricably to the politics in your country. With a subject that's so broad, it can be difficult to know where to start. Our two week programme will cover lots of ground, so I've recommended three resources here to give you a solid grounding of some of the things we'll cover in our classes.

- Book: Animal Farm by George Orwell. Don't be put off by the fact this is a whole book! It's only about 100 pages and it's very easy to read, so if you like the sound of it there's no reason not to dive in. On the surface, this is an entertaining tale about a farmyard, but look beneath the surface and you'll find a political parable for the ages.
- Article: Youth Climate Activists Say Community Helps With Mental Health Strain, Teen Vogue – Teen Vogue may not be the first place you'd think to look for politically engaged and engaging material, but their political pages are gaining popularity and cover a range of important issues. This article speaks to a range of teenagers who are involved in social movements and how they protect their mental health while fighting for the cause they believe in.

• Podcast: Anne Applebaum on why democracy is not inevitable, Democracy Works – In our first class together, we'll be looking at democracy and elections.
